Fire


The Cedar Creek Fire in Central Oregon is now 113,637 acres with 14% containment. Fire activity is expected to be minimal today into tomorrow. Possible light rainfall today could further reduce fire activity, but drier and warm weather into the weekend may increase fire activity by early next week.

Smoke


Oakridge and areas immediately west of the fire will continue to have the greatest impacts today. Very Unhealthy air quality in Oakridge this morning may improve slightly to Unhealthy by this evening. Eugene/Springfield will experience Moderate air quality overall, but will see improvement into Thursday. Areas to the east/southeast will experience Good air quality during the day, but as winds become more westerly tonight into Thursday, areas around Bend, La Pine, and Crescent Lake will see increased smoke impacts.
