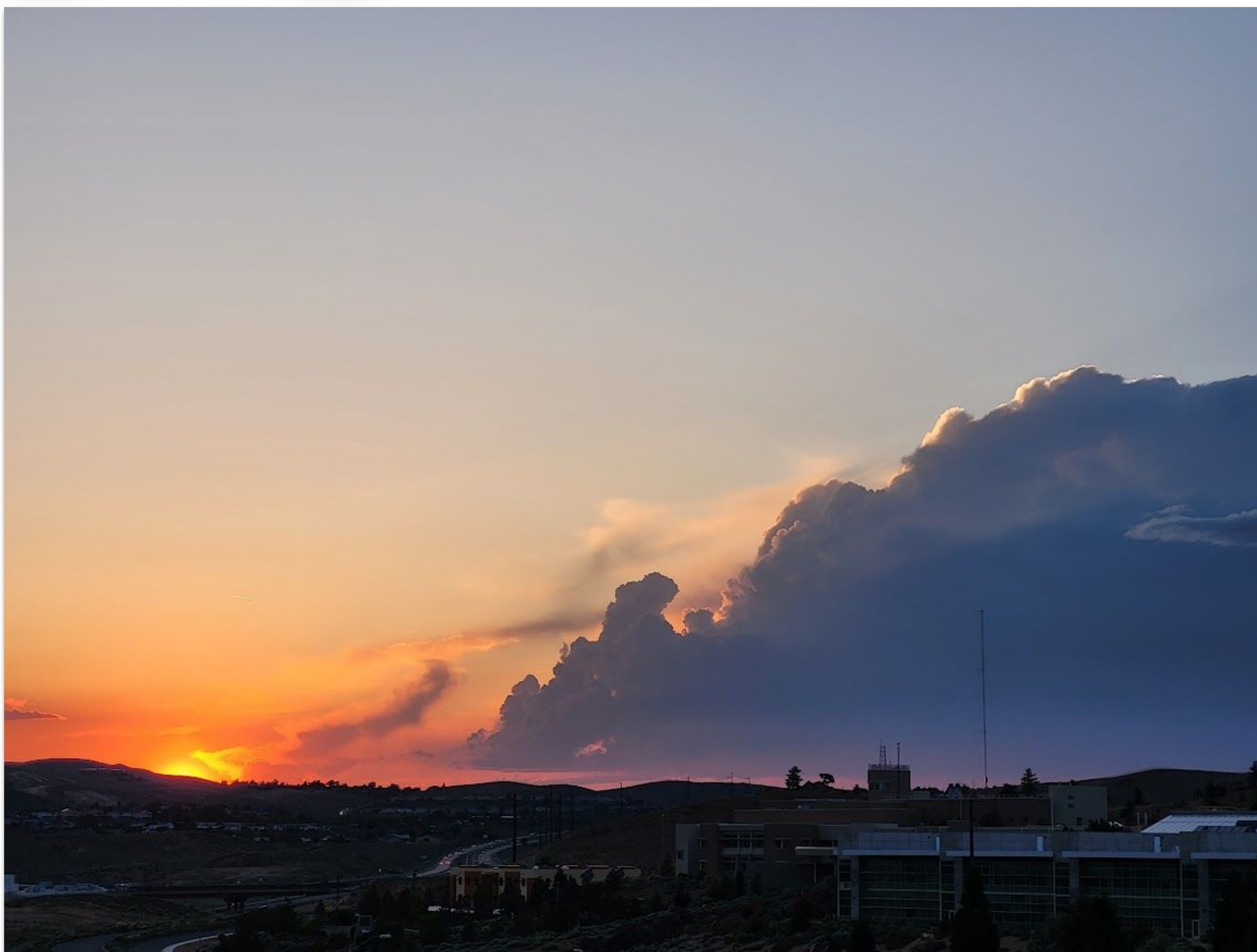

Key Points & Important Changes

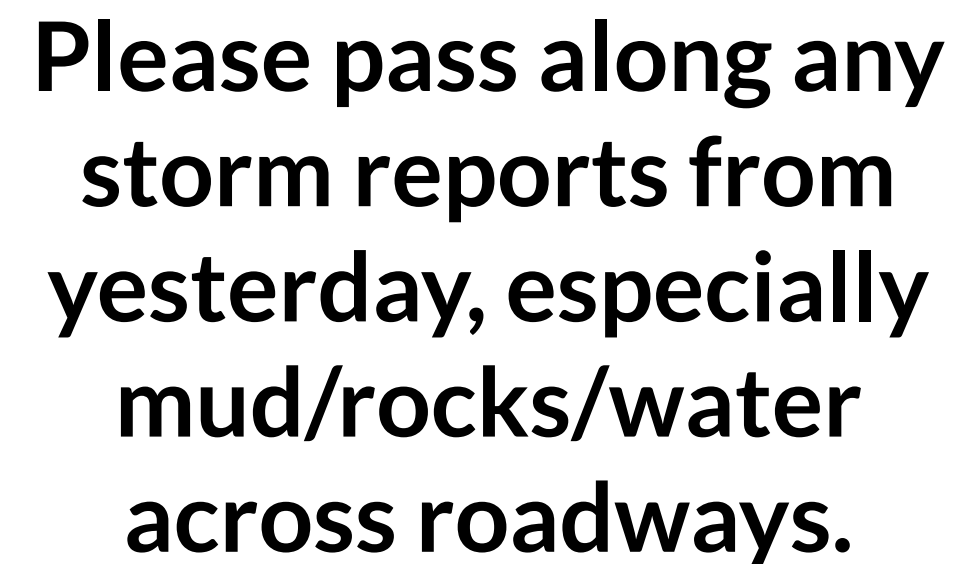
- **Showers & T-storms Today:** Plan on 30% chances for a storm to impact the Tahoe Basin and eastern Sierra in Alpine and Mono counties. Primary threats will be lightning, small hail, and localized heavy rainfall. Lesser chances (15-25%) for western NV today.
- **Summer Temps Arrive:** Warmer and drier conditions begin to take hold Thursday onward with temperatures in the mid to upper 90s for the lower valleys and the 80s in the Sierra. By this weekend, there is a 40% chance for Reno to hit the first 100° day of the year! Since 1990, the average date of the first 100° for Reno is July 10th.
- **Snowmelt River Flooding:** Heat will reinvigorate snowmelt across the Sierra during the latter half of the week. Plan on elevated flows in Eastern Sierra streams from I-80 south, and flooding in Mono County streams, and increased flooding along the Walker.

Important Changes:

- Increased confidence for our first real summer heat late this week into the weekend.

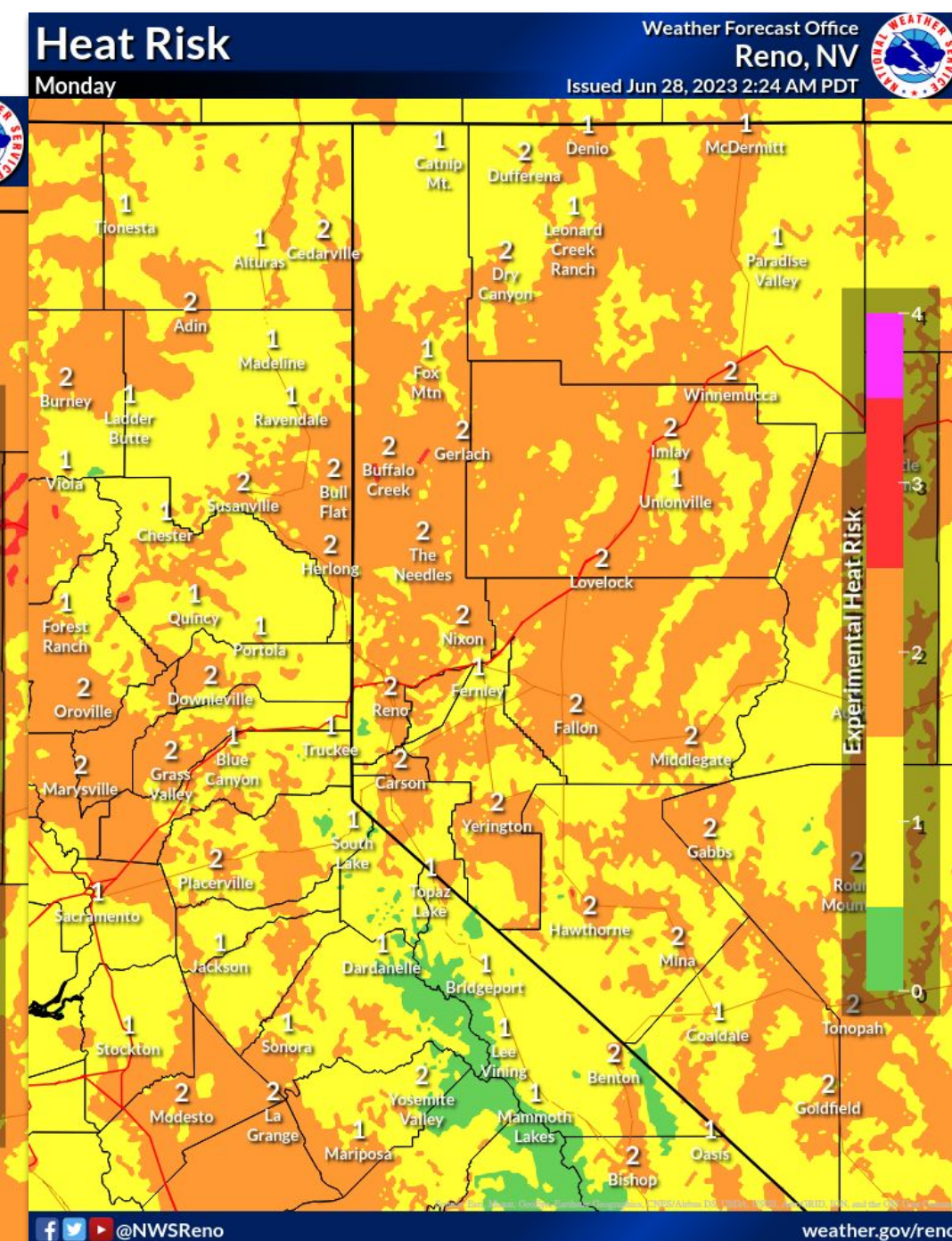
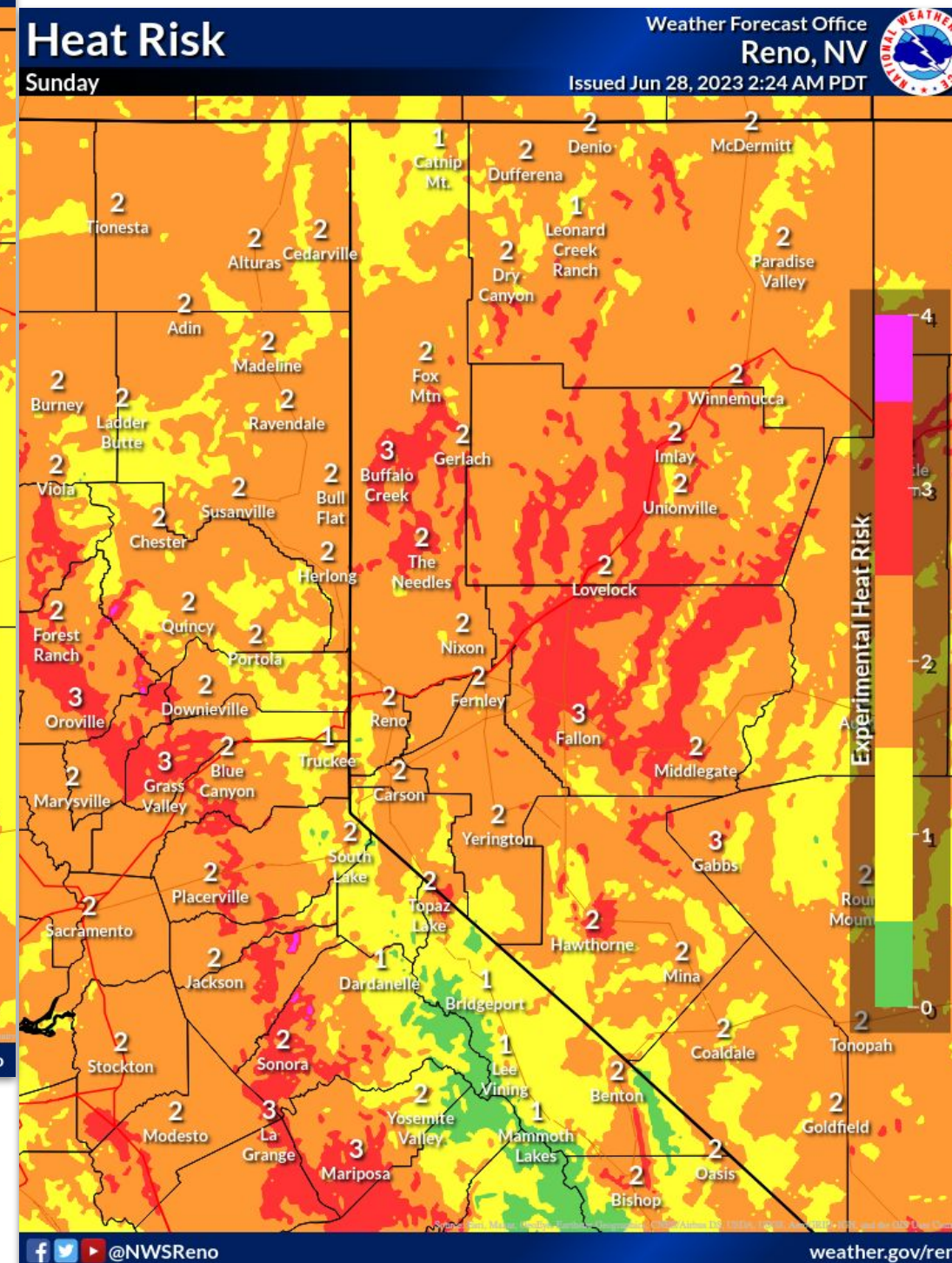
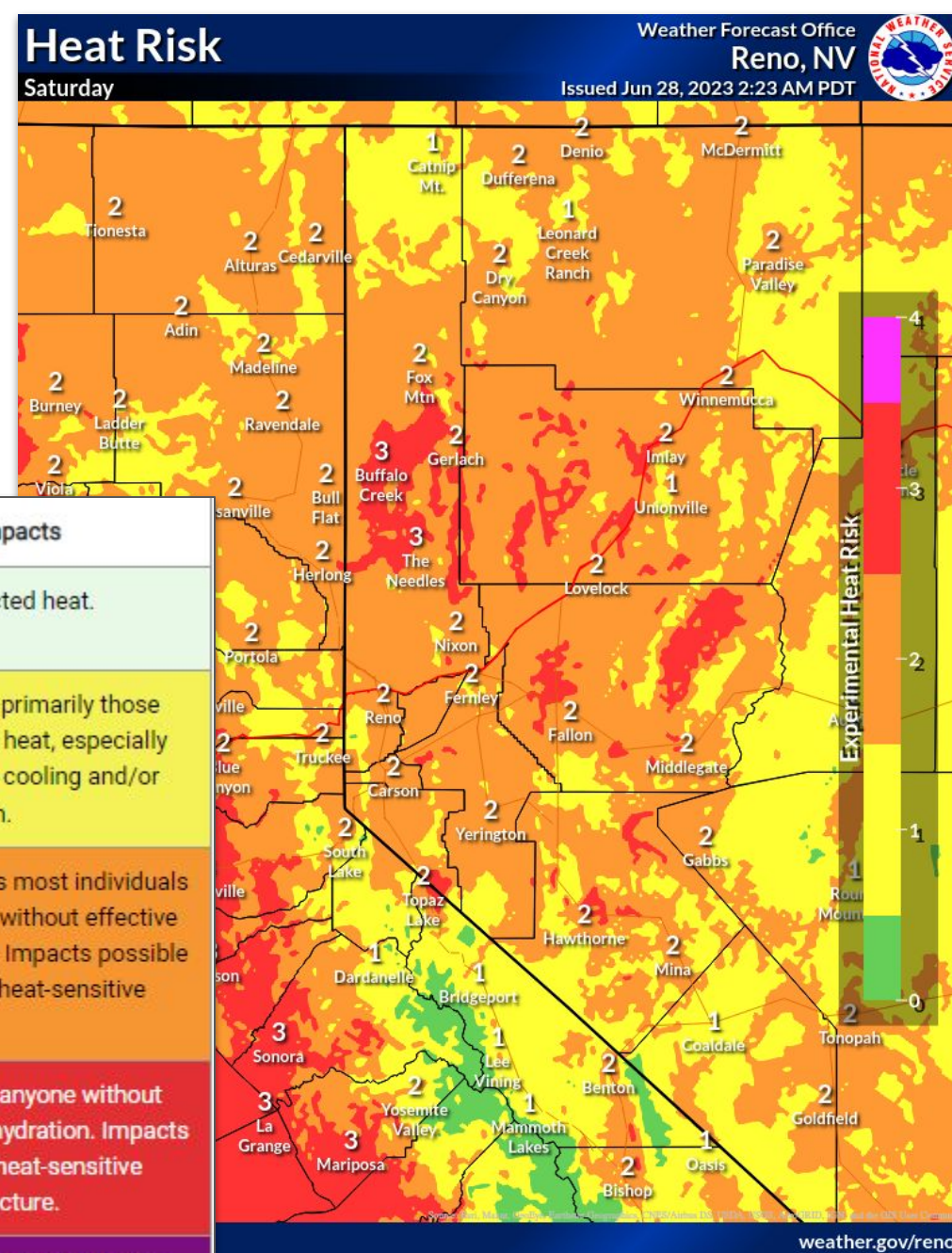
Ready for triple digit heat? The last time Reno reached 100 F was back September 8th, 2022 during our record heatwave!

Mild temperatures will continue today, followed by a significant warm-up. Here comes summer with a blast of heat as we head into July. Look for temperatures nearing 100 degrees in warmest valleys Sat/Sun. For context, average temperatures across the region for this time of year usually range from 85-92 degrees for lower valleys!



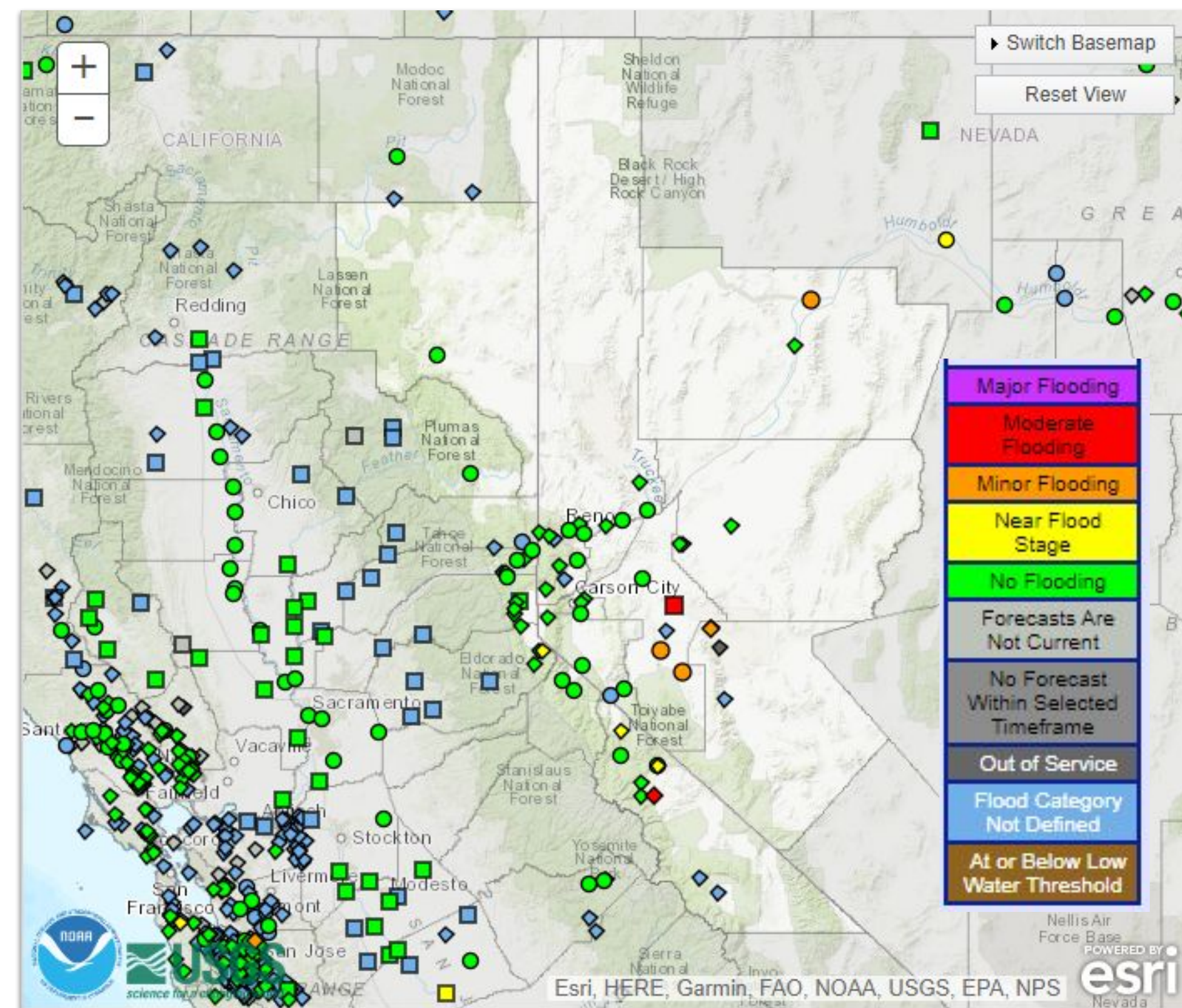
Heat Health Risk

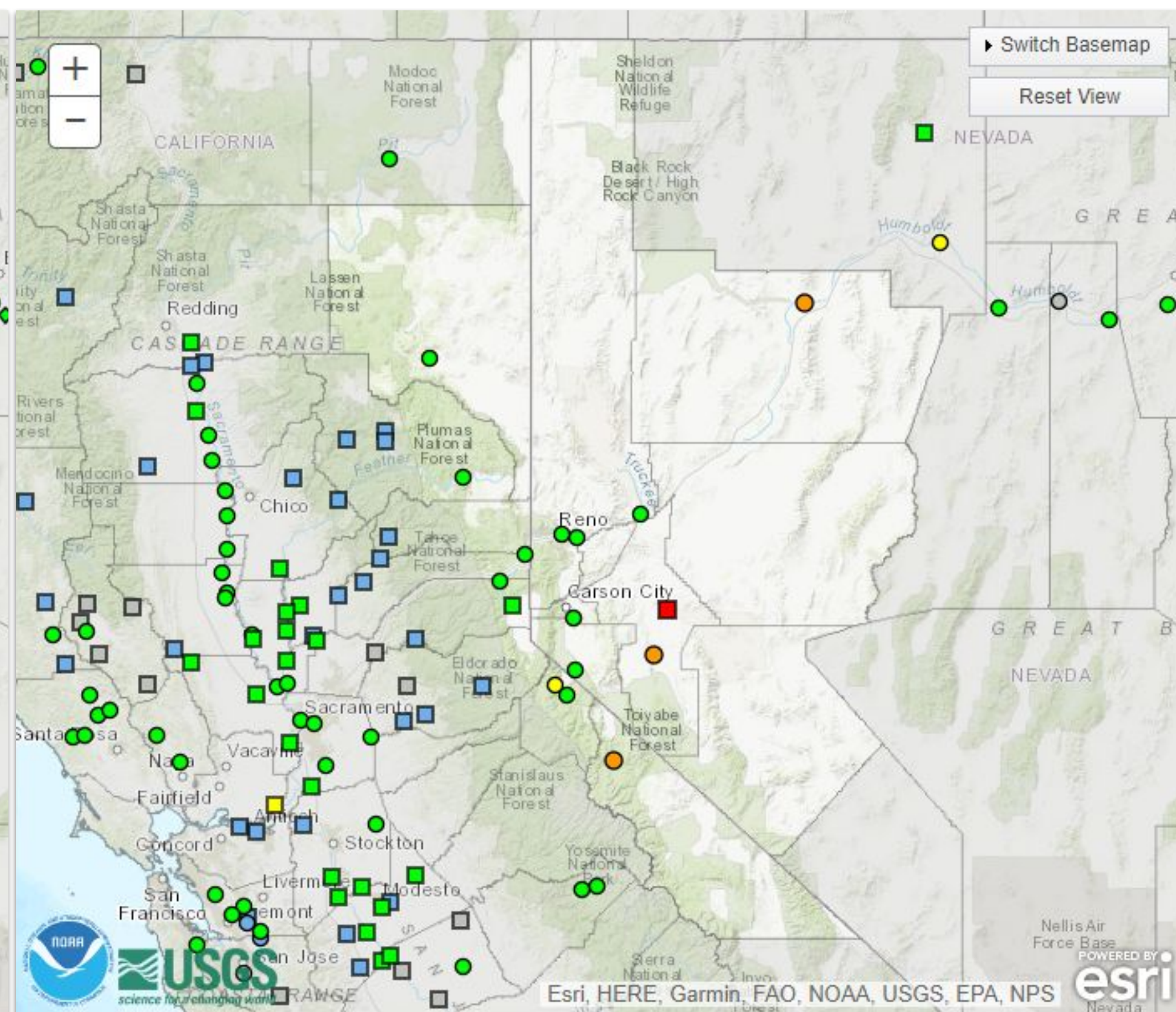


Category	Risk of Heat-Related Impacts
Green 0	Little to no risk from expected heat.
Yellow 1	Minor - This level of heat affects primarily those individuals extremely sensitive to heat, especially when outdoors without effective cooling and/or adequate hydration.
Orange 2	Moderate - This level of heat affects most individuals sensitive to heat, especially those without effective cooling and/or adequate hydration. Impacts possible in some health systems and in heat-sensitive industries.
Red 3	Major - This level of heat affects anyone without effective cooling and/or adequate hydration. Impacts likely in some health systems, heat-sensitive industries and infrastructure.
Magenta 4	Extreme - This level of rare and/or long-duration extreme heat with little to no overnight relief affects anyone without effective cooling and/or adequate hydration. Impacts likely in most health systems, heat-sensitive industries and infrastructure.

HeatRisk takes into account how unusual the heat is for the time of year, the duration of the heat (AM/PM temps), and if the temperatures pose an elevated risk of heat-related impacts based on data from the CDC.



River [Observations](#) as of 8 AM



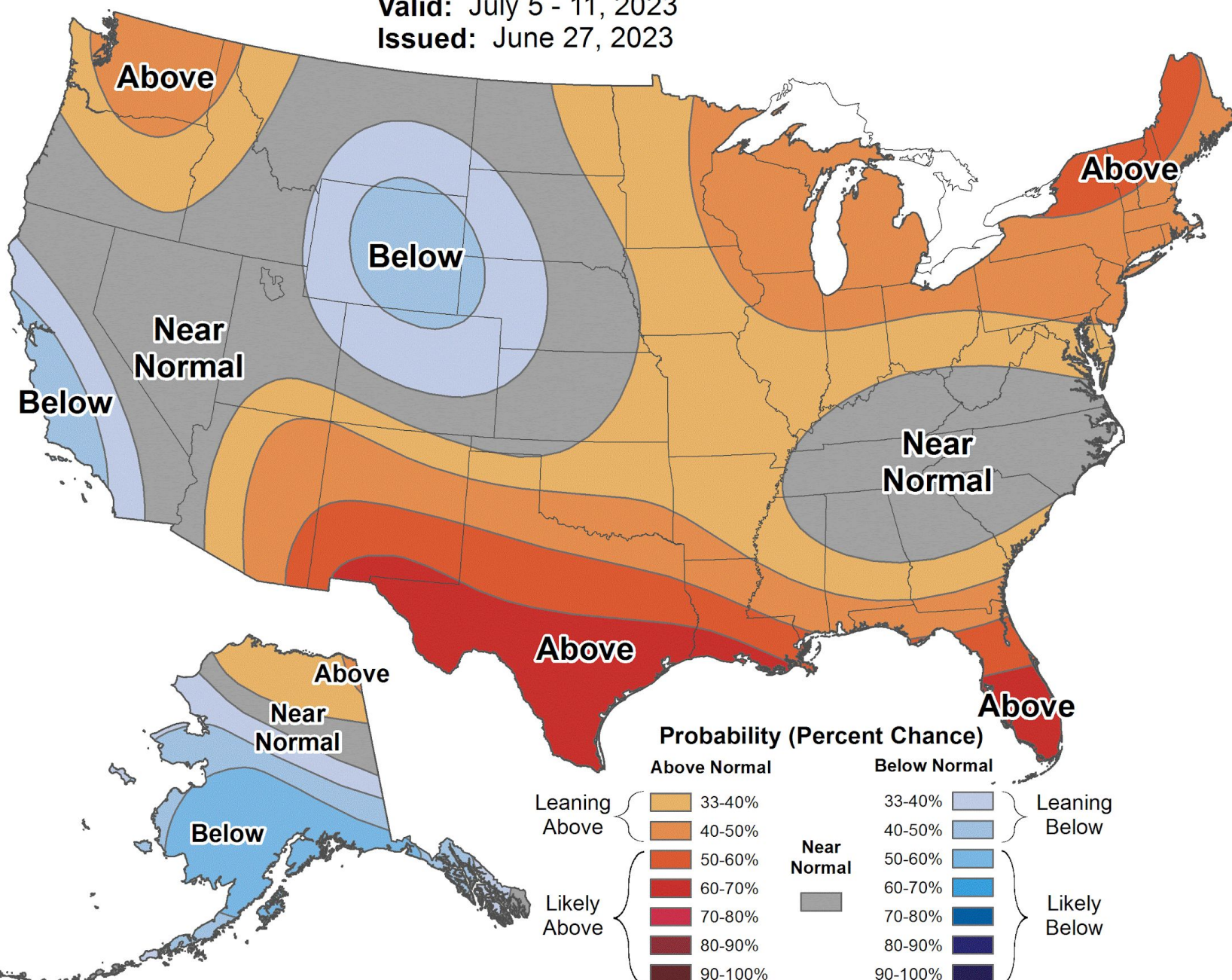

8-14 Day Temperature Outlook



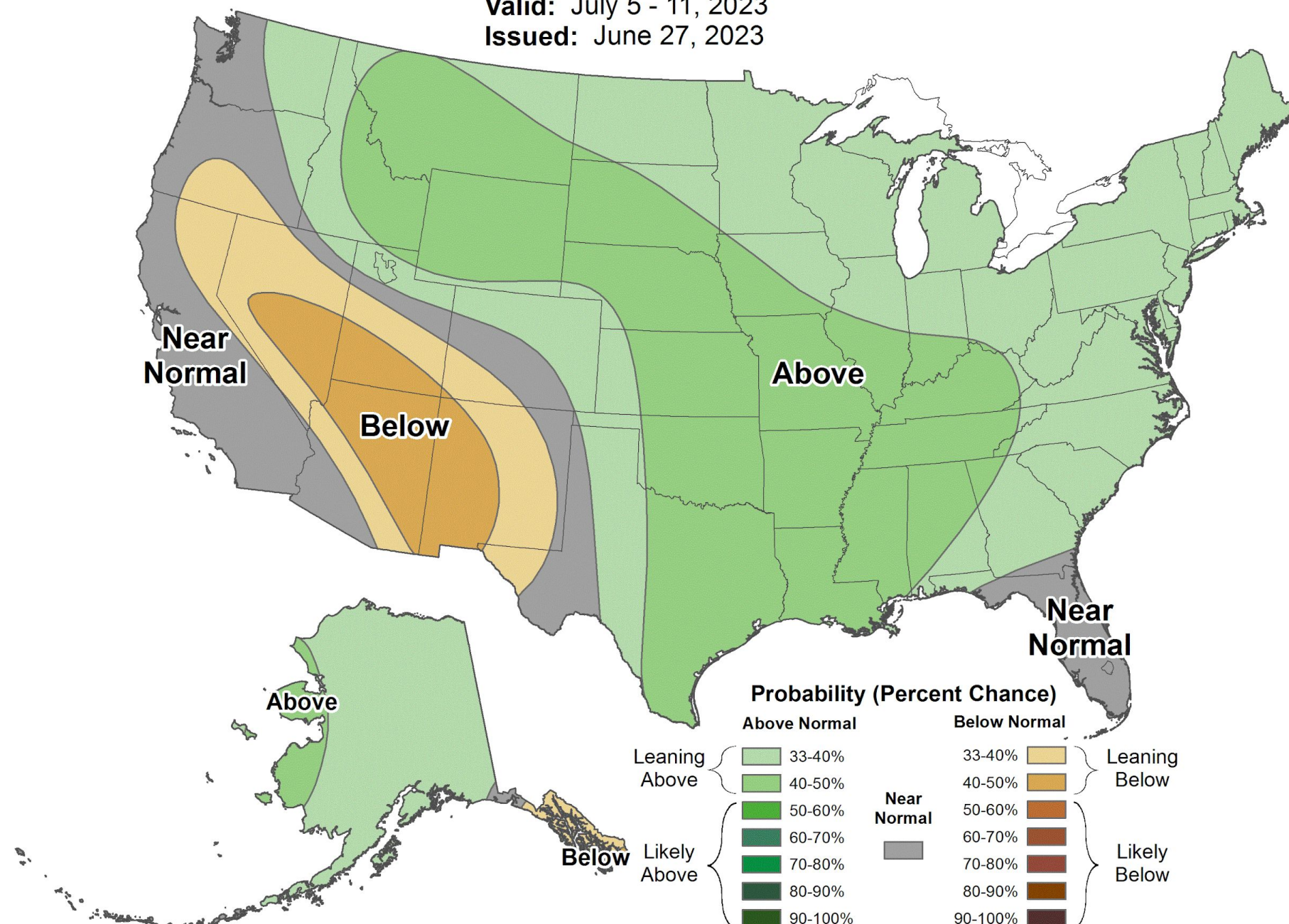
